The Queensland & Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation is an integral part of the Lions organisation. It was set up in 1963 originally to fund kidney research. Subsequently it has branched out to many areas of seed funding to enable medical researchers with PhDs to further their work and whereby if their research is successful, obtain government grants and grants from private organisations. The chairman does not have to explain that the Foundation has conducted, through its researchers, integral and important research projects. The most important factor involved is that this is a Lions organisation and in all due respects, it should receive financial support from the constitute members of the Districts 1 to 4 in Queensland and Northern New South Wales.

Even though the last year has been fruitful in the promotion of the Lions Medical Research Foundation, Personality Quest and the Art Union, we are now falling behind in relation to future funding due to lack of donations. It is submitted that the constitute clubs have the responsibility of keeping this Foundation alive.

Nevertheless, I present this report relevant to the challenges and difficulties undertaken by the Queensland & Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation for the year ending 30 June, 2014.

During the year, the past Governor of Queensland, Ms Penelope Wensley AC, was gracious in being the patron, but now the current Governor of Queensland, His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey AC, has undertaken to be patron of the Foundation.

The formal agreement entered into with the University of Queensland Diamantina Institute to support the Students Performing Advanced Research Queensland (SPARQ-ed) program is continuing and support is forthcoming towards student awareness in science. I would personally like to thank Lion Winston Fraser who is the intermediary in respect to actions undertaken with the Diamantina Institute.

A business plan has been initially constituted in its infancy and I thank Director Lyn Pysden for her efforts in this regard. If any member of the Lions family can or is willing to provide input, then the Foundation will accept same with gratitude.

In the near future, hopefully the present logo of the Foundation will be registered to protect same in its intellectual property rights subject to the purview of Lions International. This is only one factor but is one block in the building of the image of the Foundation that we may obtain independent sponsorship, donations or otherwise and be an important factor within the Lions family.

Hospital visits for Lions Club members, Personality entrants and supporters continued to be well attended this year, especially at the Princess Alexandra Hospital to see the world class research facilities at the Translational Research Institute (TRI). I thank all researchers and staff at both the Royal Brisbane Women's Hospital and the TRI for making this happen.

During the year, Dr Tracy Bjorkman requested that her fellowship be extended and was granted.

Dr Katrina Campbell has now resumed work from her maternity leave and is undertaking her research accordingly.

Dr Nadeeka Dissanayaka continued in her in-depth research.

Because of the allegations raised regarding the propriety of resulting research, our appointee for the 2014 year was disqualified and all moneys refunded accordingly. It is imperative to note that the Foundation was not disadvantaged to any degree from same.

It may be, because of the lack of funding, that a further researcher cannot be appointed for the 2015 year but that will be subject to the new board in the forthcoming year.

The great difficulty at the moment is funding as noted; donations to the Foundation has decreased alarmingly in the last four to five years.

I specifically thank Robert Dove, who has provided detailed particulars of the financial state of the Foundation. Even though the Foundation has endeavoured through the sale of the tickets in the Art Union at the rate of \$2 each, or three for \$5, our targets for income for the Foundation have not been reached. Even so, I congratulate Deputy Chair, David Lyons for his efforts especially on behalf of the Art Union and the Personality Quest for arranging motor vehicles as specific prizes.

One of our major sources of funding has always been and probably will be the Personality Quest. It raised the sum of \$159,690 even though we had a lesser number of entrants. Thankfully, as of this date there are 12 entrants for the 2014/2015 year and at the time of writing this report, two of the entrants have obtained the initial level of \$1000 towards the grand final. Hand books and entrant forms have been amended to represent the true position regarding the detail and legalities. This year, one entrant won both the Personality and Highest Fundraiser titles, Yvonne Calligeros, representing the Lions Club of Brisbane Hellenic. Congratulations Yvonne.

All the finalists in both categories were the highest of quality and it was a delight for myself to meet and entertain them in conjunction with our Quest Chairman, Ms Leslie Lyons.

Thankfully the Ray Phippard Fellowship Awards and the Ray Phippard Progressive Pin together with the Ian Fraser Humanitarian Awards continue to provide a vital and important source of income for the Foundation.

Sincere thanks are provided to all the people who have donated towards the Foundation – Lions Clubs, Personality Quest entrants, supporters, district chairs and any participants in the promotion of the foundation and the collection of donations accordingly.

Unfortunately the interest in the Foundation has waned over the last couple of years with participation at board level, for many relevant reasons, diminished. A vibrant board of directors is necessary to continue the great work undertaken by the Foundation. I implore all four Q Districts to participate and ensure that positions on the board are filled each year.

It is noted that the Foundation now has a new telephone system that allow conference calls. Therefore, prospective directors can attend the meetings without being present at the offices of the Foundation.

I am sure that with future input, the furtherance of the Foundation shall be achieved.

I personally congratulate and thank each and every board member for their participation and especially my Deputy Chair, David Lyons and Foundation Secretary, Donna Hedges for their continued and gracious support, and again I thank the Foundation's Treasurer, Robert Dove OAM for his blunt and specific advises on the treasury side and in pointing out some of the major factors in the declining finances.

During the year my fellow board member, Narelle Parkins was appointed the Administrative Officer and she is undertaking all the administrative duties in the office comprehensively and efficiently.

Personality Quest Management Committee Chair PDG, Leslie Lyons continues to work with great gusto and effort in promoting the Quest and has some very new and innovative ideas in respect to the future conduct of same. I thank her wholeheartedly for her input and support her fully in her future endeavours to modernise the Quest and bring specific awareness to it.

Deputy Chair David has been instrumental in that area together with the Art Union and has been very important in the marketing area and has been appointed Chairman of the same.

Q3 Director, Lyn Pysden will also retire at the time of the Annual General Meeting and Lion Ron Newman unfortunately due to personal reasons, has also resigned. I sincerely thank both Lyn and Ron for their contributions to the Foundation during their terms of office.

Finally without the Foundation Secretary, Donna Hedges, the majority of the board meetings would not take place efficiently. I sincerely thank her for her services and her dedication.

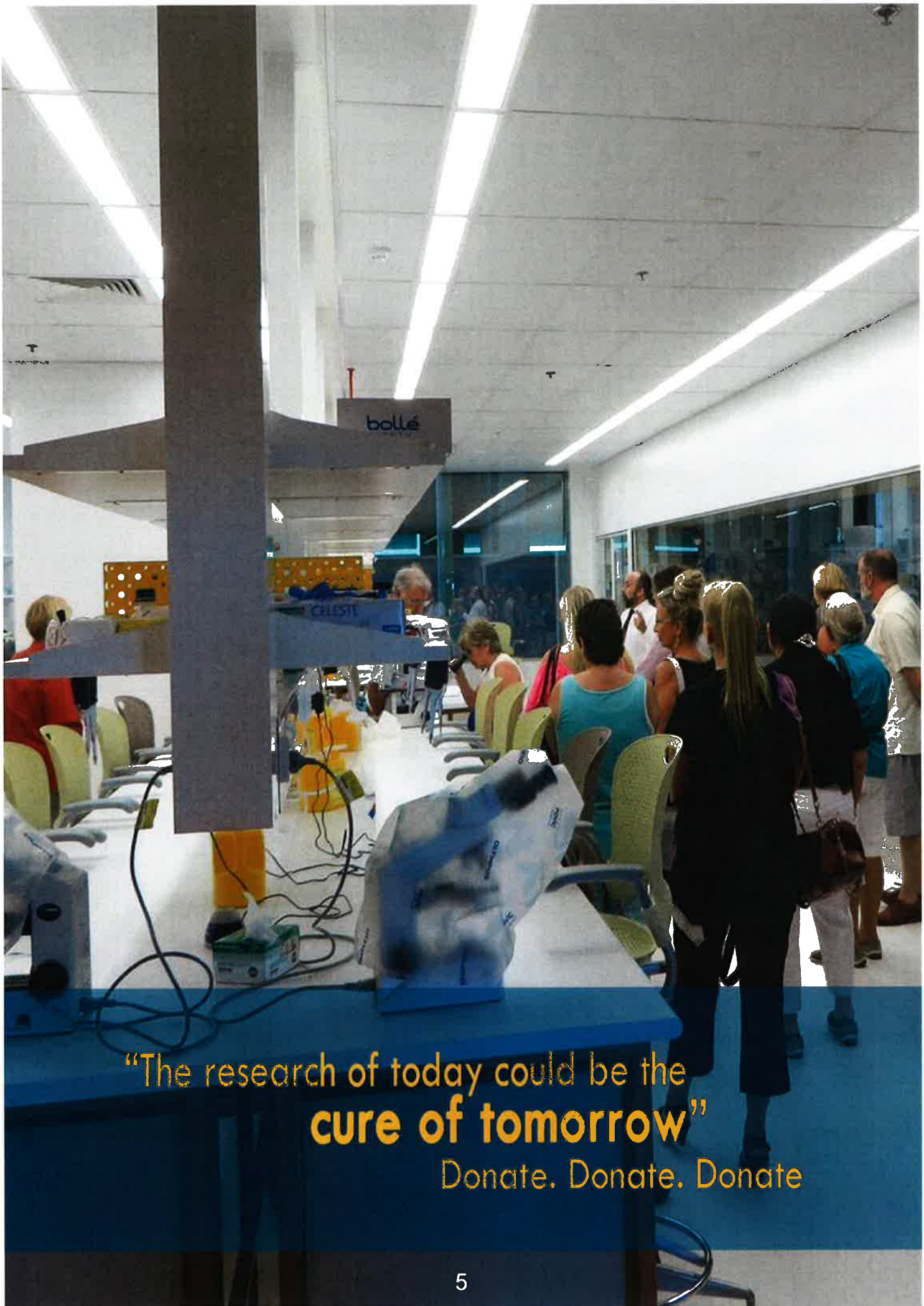
Yours truly will be retiring at the end of the year and will not be eligible for re-election.

Research Report

Seizures are more common in the newborn baby than at any other time in human life. This is not unusual though given that the brain is developing at an amazing rate during this time. However the occurrence of seizures during this period can be associated with significant risk of brain damage and later life neurological problems. As many as 5 per 1000 term newborn babies are at risk of seizures (this is even higher if you are born pre-term). A lack of oxygen and blood flow to the babies brain around the time of birth, due to issues such as placental abruption (when the placenta comes away from the uterine wall) or obstruction of the umbilical cord, is the most common cause of seizures and is responsible for up to 50% of all neonatal seizures. While there are a number of anticonvulsant drug treatments for seizures, they do not work very well in controlling seizures in the newborn brain.

The major aim of research in my laboratory is to understand more about how seizures affect the developing newborn brain and to develop better anticonvulsant treatments for babies. This year has been very busy with numerous grant applications to a wide variety of funding bodies including the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC), Brain Foundation, Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Obstetrics and Gynaecology (RANZCOG) and the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital Foundation as well overseas with a letter of intent to CURE Epilepsy in the USA that resulted in an invitation to submit a full application to this organisation. We are currently awaiting the outcome of all these applications to pursue our exciting developments for a new seizure medication for babies and to investigate how cooling protects the injured brain.

A number of projects and manuscripts have been completed this year with a major publication by PhD candidate Ms Steph Miller identifying that seizures change a protein in the brain that is the target of commonly used anticonvulsant drugs. Changes to this protein may help explain why these drugs do not work as effectively as they should.

My international collaboration with Dr Deirdre Murray from University College Cork is about to commence. Our arm of the project will form part of a larger international clinical study to investigate predictive bio-markers of hypoxic-ischemic brain injury. Being able to identify potential diagnostic markers of hypoxia-ischemia will help to better identify a HI event and the severity of such an event. This will enable clinicians to deliver the most appropriate treatments and help them in determining prognosis of affected babies.

I am extremely grateful to the Lions Medical Research Foundation and Lions Clubs for their continued support of my research. It has also been a great pleasure to be invited to several Lions events and a great opportunity to share my research achievements with the Lions and greater community.

The last 12 months has seen some significant achievements, both personally and professionally. My research team has gone from strength-to-strength, with further results from our work released in 15 peer-reviewed journal publications, a clinical trial commenced and completed, several invited conference presentations, together with 6 months of maternity leave and the birth of my gorgeous daughter Imogen in October 2013.

My work continues to centre around investigating how food-based interventions or supplements can to improve the heart health of patients with kidney disease.

I have led a study which established the significant benefit of limiting salt intake on blood pressure, protein in urine and excess fluid in the body for people with high blood pressure and kidney disease. This work as published in the top journal for this clinical area (Journal of the American Society of Nephrology) earlier this year. This study was included as a part of a Cochrane Review which will be released in the coming months, also from my group. Cochrane reviews are an authority for supporting the translation of high quality research and promoting evidence-based practice, which is an honour to be able to contribute to. The next stage of this work we are hoping to deliver on a larger, more 'real-life' research project. This work will take our project into other centres around Australia and New Zealand, and deliver our nutrition intervention (to lower salt intake) via telephone counselling, so we can reach a greater number of people, more regularly and limit their need to visit the hospital. We have found the more regular contact providing advice, support and feedback is most conducive to supporting dietary change.

Further exciting results from my group we are currently finalising highlights the benefit of providing pre- and probiotics (good bacteria and the food for the good bacteria) for heart disease risk in kidney patients. Our findings are only very new, but it is extremely exciting to think we can help heart health by promoting bowel health. My PhD student, Megan Rossi, has attracted a great amount of media interest for this project, having recently won the 3-minute Thesis competition for the whole of the University of Queensland. She will now compete in the trans-Tasman competition in Perth. We are also looking at if a treatment using food-alone, by targeting fibre in the diet, might also make a difference to heart health in kidney disease.

Due to the significant progress in my research career afforded by the generosity and support of the Lions Senior Medical Research Fellowship, I have been offered an exciting opportunity as Associate Professor at Bond University. This position will be training future dietitians through a brand new course 'Masters of Dietetics Practice'. I have been appointed to lead the research program of this course.



As my Research Fellowship is still so important to me, Lions Medical Research Foundation have kindly agreed to continue supporting my work to keep me at the Princess Alexandra Hospital for one day per week. This will ensure continuity for the important work I am doing in nutrition for kidney disease.

Research Project Report July 2013 - July 2014:

New Methods To Diagnose And Treat Depression And Anxiety In Parkinson's Disease

Thank you once again for awarding the prestigious Lions Medical Research Foundation Fellowship. This report provides progress of research between July 2013 and July 2014. The Lions Medical Research fellowship has allowed forming a research group focussed on Neuropsychiatry in Parkinson's disease (PD) under my leadership at the UQ Centre for Clinical Research (UQCCR). While continuing on existing projects, I have commenced a number of new research projects focused on improving diagnosis and treatment of anxiety and depression in Parkinson's disease (PD). I have obtained a total of \$145,000 new grant funding for studies. I have supervised a total of 23 postgraduate students, 2 undergraduate medical students, and 4 research assistants. In 2014, two Doctorate in Clinical Psychology and Clinical Neuropsychology students successfully completed their doctorate thesis. The current team comprises of 5 postgraduate research students, 8 postgraduate clinical students, 1 undergraduate medical student and 2 research assistants. In recognition of my contributions to the psychology postgraduate program, I was appointed as an adjunct research fellow at School of Psychology, The University of Queensland (UQ). In recognition of research excellence, I was awarded the UQCCR outstanding young investigator award 2013.

Research outcomes:

1. A new measure for anxiety in Parkinson's disease (PD) is developed.

This is a 5 stage project, and 4 stages have been completed. Stages 1 and 2 included a literature review and validation of current anxiety rating scales. A literature review titled: "Clinical spectrum of anxiety in PD" was published in the prestigious Movement Disorders journal, and four other publications stemming from *a successful doctorate student thesis* are currently in preparation. Another publication titled: "Characteristics and treatment of anxiety in PD" is submitted to Movement Disorders. Stage 3, characterised a novel symptomatic profile for anxiety in PD, and has been *submitted to a high impact journal, Neurology*. A novel instrument has now been developed (stage 4), and is currently undergoing validity testing (stage 5).



2. Four new psychotherapy treatment packages tailored for PD are under development and two are on clinical trial at present.

Mindfulness group therapy for PD is piloted (completed doctorate thesis in 2014). The results showed promising outcomes of reducing anxiety, depression, and distress, and improving cognitive function and walking and balance problems in PD. *Cognitive Behavioural Therapy for anxiety in PD* is currently being trialled for patients and carers. Positive individualised outcomes have been observed, enhancing patient and carer quality of life. *Acceptance and Commitment Therapy for depression and anxiety*, and *Interventions for Sleep disturbances in PD* are currently under development.

3. Novel electroencephalography (EEG) markers for cognitive impairment and depression in PD are discovered.

We have completed EEG experiments in 90 PD patients and 25 healthy older adults. The results indicated specific EEG markers for depression and cognitive decline, which can potentially be used to identify these neuropsychiatric manifestations in PD, at early stages. Two new EEG projects also commenced in 2014 (Masters in Clinical Psychology, and PhD).

Students Performing Advanced Research Queensland Program (SPARQ-ed)
The University of Queensland Diamantina Institute

SPARQ-ed is a unique biomedical science education outreach facility operating out of the Translational Research Institute (TRI) in Woolloongabba. Its aim is to provide opportunities for students and teachers from schools across Queensland to work alongside scientists at the cutting edge of biomedical research. SPARQ-ed's flagship offering is the research immersion program, where, over 5 days, senior secondary students and teachers complete a program designed by one of TRI's research groups. The intention of these programs is to offer participants an authentic biomedical science experience, with the results of the projects undertaken making a contribution to the work of the scientists involved. SPARQ-ed also offers shorter workshops for students from primary schools through to Year 12 and serves as a point of contact between school communities and biomedical researchers. SPARQ-ed is supported by grants from the University of Queensland Diamantina Institute and Queensland Government, as well as a generous donation of \$100,000 over five years from the LMRF. To date, SPARQ-ed has provided 245 innovative programs to 5916 students and 64 teachers from 157 schools across Queensland.

2014 Participation

2014 saw the transition of SPARQ-ed's management from Kelvin Grove State College to the Queensland Academy for Science Mathematics and Technology (QASMT). The new management system brought with it a revised fee structure, new opportunities to reach a wider network of school communities and an increased focus on workshops and programs for students from the middle years of schooling (upper primary and junior secondary). Research has shown that this is the critical age at which students make up their mind about pursuing a scientific career.

At the time of writing, SPARQ-ed has confirmed the following workshops :

- ≠ Four Research Immersion Programs (3 completed) for 55 students and one teacher from 23 schools
- ≠ 17 Cell and Molecular Biology Experiences (Senior Student Workshops, 16 completed) for 318 students from 11 schools
- ≠ 54 Upper Primary / Junior Secondary School Workshops (38 completed) for 1373 students from 27 schools



Appointment of SPARQ-ed Teacher

After five years of operation during which SPARQ-ed had a teaching staff of one, ably supported by an administrative officer, 2014 saw the appointment of the first SPARQ-ed Teacher, Ginnese Johnston. Ginnese has extensive experience teaching in New South Wales, and her appointment allowed a considerable expansion of workshops offered (particularly for younger students) and her experience in plant sciences has brought new insights into the material covered in these programs.

LMRF Scholarships

Thanks to the generous support of the LMRF, SPARQ-ed is able to provide scholarships to students from outside metropolitan Brisbane to assist in travel and accommodation costs for the time they attend research immersion programs. These grants of \$500 are paid to students following successful completion of the program, and reflect the commitment SPARQ-ed and the LMRF have in ensuring that our programs are provided to all students regardless of where they live in Queensland. At the time of writing this report, 12 students have successfully qualified for an LMRF Scholarship, with the following students receiving theirs in the programs completed to date :

- ≠ Wing-Yee Leung (Ryan Catholic College, Townsville), Georgia Robson, Zareve Lepik and Keely Fedorniak (St Margaret Mary's College, Townsville), and Katelyn Hafey (Pittsworth SHS) in the 7-11 July program
- ≠ Elle Nish (Maleny SHS) in the 15-19 September program
- ≠ Rachel Marano and Christina Postma (Home Hill SHS), Juliette Keane (Pimlico SHS, Townsville), and Sanaa and Nida Hafeez-Baig (Fairholme College, Toowoomba) in the 29 September – 3 October program.

New Opportunities

SPARQ-ed has recently formed a relationship with Education Queensland International to provide workshops for students on international study tours. In 2014, SPARQ-ed hosted students from Todoroki Junior and Senior High School in Japan in two workshops and the coming years will see at least two more schools engage with SPARQ-ed programs.

Through QASMT's extensive computer-based learning facilities and networks, SPARQ-ed has provided high level online learning programs to students in the middle years of schooling. It is hoped that these offerings will be expanded to include senior workshops and staff professional development programs for school communities throughout the state.

In addition to its school workshops and programs, SPARQ-ed has continued to serve as a contact point between medical researchers and the wider community. SPARQ-ed outreach programs have seen staff from the University of Queensland Diamantina Institute visit schools to act as judges in science fairs and provide specialist advice for students thinking about pursuing a career in science. In addition, SPARQ-ed has been at the forefront of public science events, such as TRI's involvement in the Brisbane Open House, displays at the Royal National Show, and activities during National Science Week.

These activities are, of course, only possible through the hard work of the staff of UQDI and SPARQ-ed, and the generous support of the LMRF. A special mention to Winston Fraser who has assisted with the liaison between the LMRF and the University of Queensland Diamantina Institute.

SUMMARY FINANCIAL REPORT For the year ended 30 June 2014

The summarised financial report is an extract from the full financial report for the year ended 30 June 2014. The financial statements and specific disclosures included in the summarised financial report have been derived from the 2014 financial report of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation.

The summarised financial report cannot be expected to provide as full an understanding of the financial performance, financial position and financing and investing of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation as the full financial report.

The full financial report and the auditor's report will be sent to all voting members on request, free of charge and will be available on the Foundation website.



Discussion and analysis of the summary financial accounts

1. Statement of Comprehensive Income

The 2014 year deficit was \$58,251, an increase of \$33,389 on the 2013 \$ 24,962 deficit.

In 2014 total revenue decreased to \$454,856 from \$524,056 in the 2013 year.

Donations received decreased to \$191,612 in the 2014 year, down from \$ 198,871 in the 2013 year.

There were also decreases in donations for Ray Phippard awards with \$8,800 received in the 2014 year compared with \$19,600 in the 2013 year.

Interest income continued to decrease in the 2014 to \$72,445; down from \$86,331 in the 2013 year. The decrease in the interest income amount in 2014 is reflective of the low interest rates throughout the year.

Medical research grants in the 2014 year were \$245,000 compared with \$236,667 in 2013.

Employee expenses in 2014 year were \$89,309 compared with \$102,686 in 2013.

Administration and office expenses in 2014 were \$43,008 which was \$1 down on the previous year's \$43,009.

Other expenses decreased in the 2014 year to \$32,559, down from \$56,000 in the 2013 year.

2. Statement of Financial Position

The net assets of the entity reduced to \$2,390,877 in 2014 (2013: \$ 2,449,128) which is in line with the net loss in the 2014 year.

Inventory on hand at 30 June 2014 increased to \$62,646 up from \$57,202 in 2013 year.

3. Statement of Cash Flow

Cash on hand at 30 June 2014 decreased by \$74,658 from \$384,844 in 2013 to \$310,186. The decrease in cash on hand is reflective of the increased net loss for the 2014 year; increased investment in inventories on hand and purchase of photocopier.
