Chair David Eades



The ancient Chinese curse 'may you live in interesting times' sums up the LMRF's year under review. It is also ironic that China provided the crucible for the COVID-19 virus which has become the curse amongst us and the reason for so many changes in our lives and businesses!

In the past year we have seen the impact of COVID-19 manifest itself on our business, some Board changes, a staff departure, the development of strategic and operating plans, a revision of the Foundation's business model, solid progress with the financials and continuing tweaking of overheads.

Following the departure of the previous Chair in July, I was elected by the Board to the leadership role, for which I am both grateful and humbled.

I do not underestimate the challenges

facing LMRF, which are probably the greatest it has faced in its almost 60-year history.

The triple whammy of the sudden loss of income from a waning Personality Quest, the direct impacts of COVID-19 on operations and the knock-on effects of COVID on our constituent Lions Club's fundraising abilities have all combined to impact our forward financial projections.

From a trading perspective the Foundation remains solid and targeted expenditure trimming, implementation of a number of Board initiatives and the early success of a recent bequest program have laid a platform for a more stable financial future.

Added to this, our core business, the seed-funding of emerging researchers, is delivering success. Both of our current Fellows are delivering positive outcomes with Dr Olivia Holland making steady progress with her work on gestational diabetes and the recently promoted Associate Professor Carlos Salomon's work on early ovarian cancer detection reaching the exciting stage of commencement of the clinical trial phase.

As a part of its strategy the Board has resolved to capitalise on this success by adding adolescent health to its research agenda in response to the growing impacts of some diseases on the 10 to 24 year-old cohort. These health issues included cancers, obesity, diabetes, eating disorders,



skin conditions and other diseases which have dire consequences for youth and their families. These consequences can include isolation, family disruption, depression, risky behaviours, substance abuse and self-harm/suicide.

The organisation is also in discussion with the University of Queensland in relation to joint funding of an accelerated program of work by Carlos to expedite the delivery of his life-saving research to the market.

All this does not happen without the ongoing support of our 201Q District Governors and cabinets, for all of which my Board is extremely grateful.

My thanks to my fellow Board members who are reenergised, Narelle Parkins our executive officer and the many volunteers who assist the Foundation each and every week.

The year saw the departure of several Board members in Dr Grace Lai and John Holliday and my thanks goes to them for their contribution. I also welcome their replacements in Past District Governor Ross Gibbins who has stepped up to the Company Secretary role (and capably led our strategic planning process) and more recently Aussie Lanphier from District Q2.

The Foundation has funded 57 Fellows over its period of operation delivering life-changing research in areas as diverse as cord blood, human cornea storage, diabetes, snake venom anti-coagulants,

HPV, cancers, mental illness, kidney and liver disease, pre and neonatal care, pharmacology, haematology, epidemiology, neurology, immunology and reproductive health.

It is a constant wonder to me that, over the years, these researchers have been managed by a board of resolute volunteers backed by an equally dedicated and extensive list of volunteer Lions clubs across northern NSW and Queensland.

The impact of lives, longevity and quality of life that has been delivered by this research is inestimable however, the lives saved alone must run into the tens of millions worldwide.

It is in this context that we look to the future, a future that will see the organisation back in the million-dollar funding league, delivering the thing that keeps us all motivated, the life-saving breakthroughs, the quality-of-life outcomes and above all, hope for the afflicted and suffering.

It would also be remiss of me to not remind those reading this report that the LMRF awards offering has been expanded to include a Professor Ian Frazer Progressive award. This is one of the many ways that Lions and the community members they work with can be recognised with for the contribution they make in support of this research.

A RAPID BLOOD TEST FOR EARLY DETECTION OF OVARIAN CANCER.

Ovarian Cancer (OVCA) remains one of the major causes of death for females worldwide. Survival rates depend on several factors, including tumour stage and response to chemotherapy.

The biggest challenge in ovarian cancer is not treatment, it is rather the lack of tools to detect the disease at a treatable stage. Unfortunately, a significant proportion of women are often diagnosed with advanced stage disease, where the 5-year survival rate is approximately 20%, compared to 90% (when diagnosis is made at an early stage of disease).

Therefore, there is an urgent clinical need to develop techniques to identify OVCA,

before the cancer has metastasised. The focus of my current research is to validate a biomarker assay that was developed in our lab, for the early detection of epithelial ovarian cancer through a blood test.

An early detection test is essential to raising the 5-year survival rate of ovarian cancer patients. Therefore, my main goal is to create a blood test that will diagnose the most common form of ovarian cancer (High Grade Serous) at its earliest and most curable stage.

With the support of Lions Medical Research (LMRF), I am conducting my research in a manner that can lead to better outcomes for women and being able to communicate the outcomes to the wider community to help bridge the gap between scientists and society.



My research is primarily aimed at targeting this unmet goal through the use of small extracellular vesicles (EV) known as exosomes. EV are released from multiple cells, including cancer cells, and have the microenvironment, thus providing a magnified view of an otherwise difficult-to-access site. This capacity of exosomes makes them an ideal biomarker to detect changes in the ovary before the appearance of physical symptoms associated with advanced stage disease, proposing exosomes as "liquid biopsies". In the last 4 years, with the support of LMRF, my group has developed a biomarker panel that can identify women with early-stage ovarian cancer with over 90% accuracy.

Ovarian cancer is one of the most lethal women's cancers worldwide. Its high mortality rate is often attributed to the non-specific nature of early symptoms of disease. Developing a better understanding of disease progression and identifying clinically useful biomarkers that aid in clinical management are requisite to reducing the mortality rate of ovarian cancer. Reduced oxygen tension (i.e. hypoxia) is not only a characteristic of solid tumors but may also enhance the metastatic capacity of tumors by inducing the release of tumor growth promoting factors. Recently, it has been proposed that exosomes facilitate cancer progression.

Recently, we have published a study in the journal *Cancers*, that established that sEVs produced under low oxygen tension include a metabolic switch in ovarian cancer cells associated with changes in glycolytic pathway proteins that promote resistance to carboplatin. Significantly, we identified a suite of sEV-associated glycolysis pathway proteins that are present in patients with ovarian cancer that can predict disease recurrence with 90% accuracy.

Our research, and the resulting impact for the research community, has been very strong thanks to the generous support of the Queensland and Northern NSW Lions Medical Research Foundation

I am happy to report that I have now obtained research grants from the Medical Research Future Funding (MRFF), that will allow us to validate the early diagnostic test and initiate the implementation in clinical practice. My research is now expanding, thanks to a \$2.7 million funding boost from the MRFF. This grant will allow further challenge the accuracy of this test with a much larger trial - an essential next step in the research process. In the next 4 years we will trial the test on 4000 samples from the largest screening study to date, the UK Collaborative Trial of Ovarian Cancer Screening.

Thank you to the Lions Medical Research Foundation for continuing to support my research into gestational diabetes. Gestational diabetes, the most common serious pregnancy complication and it is expected that rate will continue to rise. A diagnosis of gestational can be distressing for women and their families, with gestational diabetes greatly increasing the likelihood of dangerous pregnancy complications and long-term health problems, including making it much more likely that both mother and child will develop type 2 diabetes. Despite gestational diabetes' importance, there is limited understanding of why this disorder makes pregnancy more dangerous and how best to identify women at the greatest risk of poorer outcomes. I study gestational diabetes to better understand this

important disorder and to improve the health of mothers and their children.

Our research has been well supported this year, with nearly \$175,000 in funding awarded, including over \$100,000 for sophisticated new state of the art research equipment that will be critical to our continuing world-class investigations, and over \$70,000 towards our work that addresses limitations in current medical care and develops better ways to monitor health during pregnancy.

It has been a busy year for scientific conferences; I've presented three times and attended seven conferences so far, with more still to go. I have also been part of organising our local Queensland Perinatal Consortium Annual Conference and Centre for Children's Health Research Higher Degree by Research Student and Early/Mid-Career Researchers 2021 Research Symposium Week. Although most of the conferences have been virtual, they have still been a great way to find out and share the latest research. I'm especially looking forward to the Australian Physiological Society Annual Scientific Meeting that will be held face to face at Griffith University on the Gold Coast in November.

The lab has grown this year, with two new PhD students, two new Master's students, an Honours student, and four undergraduate students all working on



research projects. I'm very proud of my student Dr Nirajan Shrestha, who was successfully awarded his PhD this year and is now working how health during pregnancy affects the health of the child at the very prestigious Harvard University, and also of my student Natalie Turner, who was awarded her PhD Confirmation, which demonstrates a successful first year of her PhD.

Sunday 14th November, will be World Diabetes Day, and I will be with my club, the Lions Club of Gold Coast Tallebudgera doing our Lap the Map event on the Gold Coast to help raise money and awareness.

I would like to thank all the Lions for their support of this important health issue, and for their support of my research through the LMRF. With your support we can help tackle this critical health issue and improve many lives.

Students Performing Advanced Research QLD



SPARQ-ed is a unique educational facility established between the Department of Education and the University of Queensland. Our cutting-edge facility features a fully equipped PC2 biomedical teaching laboratory and learning centre, located at the Translational Research Institute (TRI) in Brisbane, providing school students a practical introduction to biomedical research.

The SPARQ-ed research immersion program provides students with an opportunity to work alongside a dynamic group of scientists and like-minded peers on pressing biomedical problems facing society. The program is open to year 10, 11 and 12 students with an interest in STEM throughout Queensland.

Over the 5-day program students:

- Gain hands-on experience in our state-of-the-art PC2 biomedical research laboratory
- Attend cutting-edge biomedical science research seminars
- Learn valuable academic research skills, and
- Showcase their findings in a research forum.

Working in a team on a real research project, students will use the latest technology to examine, test and analyse their results, then discuss findings with world renowned university researchers based at the Translational Research Institute.

At the end of their program students will have the opportunity to complete two written tasks which are used to assess their suitability to receive an ATAR adjustment factor for entry into selected programs at UQ.

The SPARQ-ed team would like to thank Lions Medical Research Foundation for its continued support of the SPARQ-ed program and importantly, for enabling the attendance of our regional and remote students. We had strong representation of regional and remote students in all five research immersions conducted, and another group of students enrolled for our final immersion for the year, to be held between 29th November and 3rd December 2021.

In total there have been 25 student scholarships awarded in 2021 and through the generous support of LMRF regional and remote families have been able to access this transformative educational experience, without a financial burden.

NEW Regional Professional Development Workshop.

The SPARQ-ed team recently travelled to Dalby (Darling Downs Southwest Region) to deliver a special workshop for teachers and Science technicians. This transformative workshop has been designed for teachers of Year 10 Science, Year 11 and 12 Biology, however, could also be used as an extension activity for STEM specialist groups/classes.

This workshop will support school staff in implementing Biology, Chemistry, Australian Curriculum Science and VET courses essential to the professional practice of teachers engaging students in STEM. Participants will transform bacteria cells with pGLO plasmid using simple biotechnology techniques.







Notes the Financial Statements for year ended 30 June 2021

The financial statements cover Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation (LMRF), as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation is a company limited by guarantee and is registered as a deductible gift recipient.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

Note 1. Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. The responsible persons have determined that the Company is not a reporting entity. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis, are based on historic costs, and do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the following significant policies, which the responsible persons have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless otherwise stated. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Note 2. Summary of significant Accounting Policies

(a) Plant and equipment

All assets acquired, including plant and equipment, are initially measured at their cost at the date of acquisition, being the fair value of the consideration provided plus incidental costs directly attributable to the acquisition, including costs incurred in getting the assets ready for use. Plant and equipment is carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

Expenditure on repairs and maintenance is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of each item of plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative periods are 3–7 years.

Plant and equipment are also assessed for any indicators of impairment each year. Further details on impairment calculations are provided in Note 9.

() Investments

Investments in managed share portfolios are financial assets classified as 'held for trading' and measured at fair value. They are classified as fair value through profit or loss, with directly attributable transaction costs recognised in profit or loss as incurred. Changes in the fair value of such assets, including any interest or dividend income, are recognised in profit or loss.

(a) Leases

Leases where LMRF, as lessee, does not assume substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are considered operating leases and not recognised on LMRF's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating lease are recognised in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

(b) Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying values of its financial and non-financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset (being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal

and its value in use) is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(e) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from customers and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the reporting date for goods and services received by the Company which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally being paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(h) Provisions

A provision is recognised if, as the result of a past event, LMRF has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably and it is probable that an outflow or economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

(i) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term benefits

Liabilities for employee benefits for wages, annual leave, long service leave and other leave represent present obligations resulting from employees' services provided to the reporting date and are calculated at undiscounted amounts based on remuneration wage rates that LMRF expects to pay within 12 months after reporting date including related on-costs, such as workers compensation insurance and payroll tax.

(ii) Other long-term employee benefits

LMRF's net obligation in respect of long-term employee benefits is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

(iii) Superannuation contributions

Liabilities in relation to contributions to superannuation funds (including defined contribution superannuation funds) are recognised as an expense in profit or loss when they are due.

(j) Revenue recognition

Sales revenue

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Company expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services. Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

1. Identify the contract with the customer
2. Identify the performance obligations
3. Determine the transaction price
4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations
5. Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Donations

Donations are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Amounts arising from grants in the scope of AASB 1058 are recognised at the assets fair value when the asset is received. LMRF considers whether there are any related liability or equity items associated with the asset which are recognised in accordance with the relevant accounting standard.

Once the assets and liabilities have been recognised then income is recognised for any remaining asset value at the time that the asset is received.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Volunteer services

The company has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other form of contribution received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

All revenues are recognised at the fair value of the consideration received net of Goods and Services Tax (GST).

(k) Investment income

Investment income includes interest and dividend income earned on investments in managed share portfolios and interest income on other funds invested. Interest income is recognised as it accrues using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

(l) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Company is exempt from income tax under Section 505 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(m) Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(n) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the company for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2020. The company has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

(o) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting

period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and Assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The company determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets The company assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the company and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

To the members of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation, which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2021, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statement, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the directors' declaration.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis of Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial report of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation has been prepared in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*, including:

- (a) giving a true and fair view of the Company's financial position as at 30 June 2021 and of its performance for the year ended on that date; and
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1, and Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with similar organisations it is not practical to maintain an effective system of control over revenue recognition and the system of credits available for club donations, therefore we are only able to audit receipts and club credits once they have been entered into the books of account and we may not detect where cash is received and is not included in the recorded income (2021: \$357,147; 2020: \$175,507) or where club credits (2021: \$134,881) have been calculated inaccurately.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* (ACNC Act) and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Company's financial reporting responsibilities under the ACNC Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Financial Report

The directors of the Company are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the ACNC Act and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.
