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CHAIR'S REPORT

The Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation (LMRF) is a well-established organisation committed to fostering the next generation of medical breakthroughs by providing essential startup funding to early-career medical researchers.



The Foundation has several fundraising projects, but philanthropy through tax-deductible giving is also important to our fundraising activities.

The LMRF Board has made a significant commitment by establishing an annual grant of \$50,000 known as the "George and Jean Higgs Memorial Fund". This fund is named in recognition of the generous testamentary bequest provided by George and Jean Higgs to the Foundation. The purpose of this fund is to support early career medical researchers in developing their research identity and advancing their research leverage through philanthropic and competitive funding.

Additionally, the Board has agreed to continue the SPARQ-ed program for an additional two years beyond the expiration of the current funding agreement in 2025. The cost of this extension is \$40,000 per year. SPARQ-ed (Students Performing Advanced Research Queensland) is an exceptional educational initiative that offers students from around Queensland the opportunity to engage in week-long programs with renowned biomedical research groups at the Translational Research Institute in Brisbane. This program allows students to conduct experimental projects and gain valuable research experience.

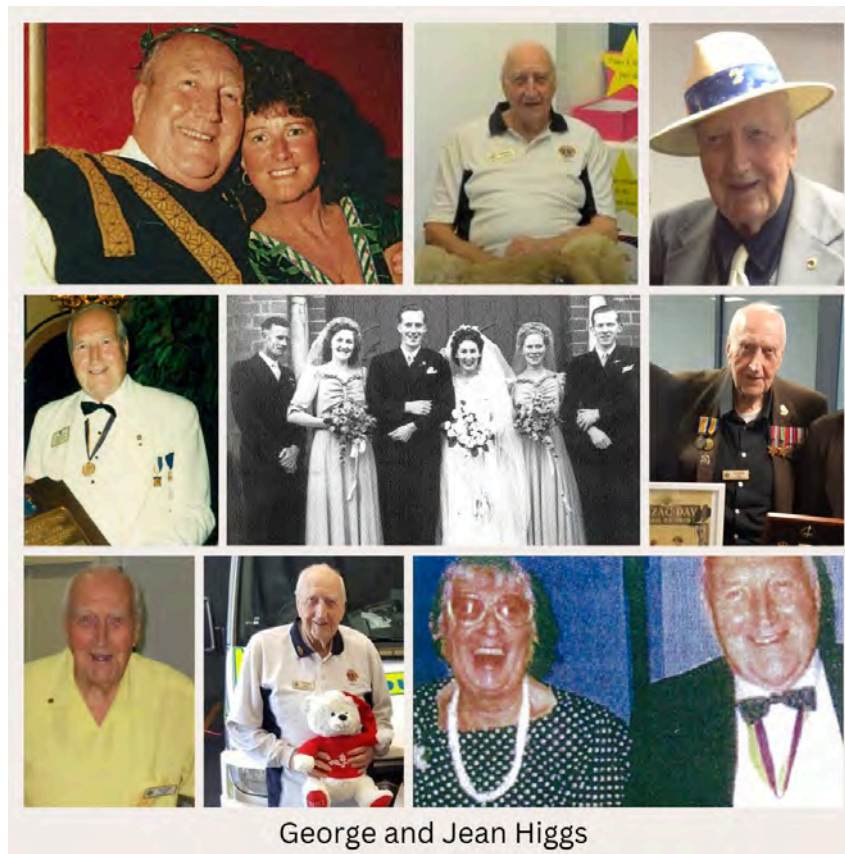

Determining the role of the placental mitochondria in gestational diabetes

Diabetes in pregnancy is common, with more than 1 in 6 pregnancies affected. Treatment focuses on managing elevated blood sugar levels. Initially, we often attempt to control high blood sugar through changes to diet, but if this isn't sufficient medication may be needed.

Understanding the risk factors that lead to diabetes in pregnancy and which women may require medication would help provide the best care. Our goal is to deepen our understanding of the onset and progression of diabetes in pregnancy. This will pave the way for a more personalised medical approach that could develop improved tests that provide women and healthcare providers with insights into the risk of developing diabetes in pregnancy and the likelihood of needing medication.



Our group's research centres on how we can better monitor pregnancy health, with a key focus on the role of the placenta. This year, the work of PhD students Hannah and Hasini has been recognised internationally, with oral and poster presentations at the highly influential International Society of Ultrasound in Obstetrics and Gynecology World Congress in Budapest that had over 2,500 attendees.

Closer to home, I was thrilled with the success of our local Waves of Change Conference that we ran at Gold Coast University Hospital 9-11 August in conjunction with the Stillbirth Centre for Research Excellence. With nearly 300 attendees and very positive feedback about a program designed to improve the health of mums and babies this will now be an annual event alternating between the Gold Coast and Brisbane.

In other local events, on 26 May we organised the Gold Coast and Brisbane Preeclampsia Day Walk to raise funds for the fantastic charity Australian Action on Preeclampsia that provides support and information to families. Preeclampsia is another important pregnancy complication, which is much more common in women who have diabetes in pregnancy.

In collaboration with the clinical research team, I'm very excited to be part of a new project coordinated at Gold Coast Health on optimising maternal and perinatal outcomes through a National Health and Medical Research Council Partnership Project Grant. I have also been awarded \$1,111 in funding from Gold Coast Health to attend the Australian and New Zealand Placental Research Association Satellite Meeting in Adelaide in November, and \$4,619 from Griffith University to support developing a research project to help better predict miscarriage.

Our group's students have been successful in receiving support and prizes this year, with Hasini awarded a School of Pharmacy and Medical Sciences Collaborative Merit Grant for \$3,921 to investigate how viral infection may lead to stress in placental cells, and Dayna winning best oral presentation at the University of Queensland School of Biomedical Sciences Higher Degree Research Symposium as well as a travel award to attend the International Federation of Placental Associations Conference in Canada.

The work that we do to improve our understanding of pregnancy complications and develop better ways to treat these complications would not be possible without your support through the Lions Medical Research Foundation. Your contributions are key to advancing medical research in Australia, which is bringing us one step closer to beating diabetes in pregnancy.

Diagnosing ovarian cancer recurrence and chemoresistance using extracellular vesicles

Introduction:

It is with great pleasure that I present this report on the progress and achievements made possible by the generous support of the Lions Medical Research Foundation (LMRF) and Lions Clubs. As an LMRF Fellow, I have had the honour of leading impactful research focused on advancing diagnostics in ovarian cancer and, more recently, gestational diabetes mellitus (GDM). This report highlights the key developments of the past year, emphasising our ongoing efforts in DNA-based blood diagnostics and research, which hold immense potential for improving patient outcomes.



Project Overview:

Ovarian cancer and GDM present substantial challenges to women's health. Over 60% of women with advanced ovarian cancer experience disease recurrence due to chemoresistance, where cancer cells no longer respond to treatment. Currently, limited diagnostic tools exist to predict chemotherapy response or recurrence in ovarian cancer.

To address this, my team is developing a blood test capable of detecting specific DNA markers that signal chemoresistance and chemotherapy response. This innovation is poised to fill a significant gap in medical diagnostics, offering an essential tool for personalised patient care.

Building upon our success in ovarian cancer, we have expanded our efforts to GDM, a condition affecting many pregnant women. By studying DNA markers in blood, we aim to predict the risk of complications from GDM, facilitating early interventions that could greatly improve maternal and child health outcomes.

Research Achievements

Scientific Advancements: Over the past year, our laboratory has made significant strides in genomic research, which involves the analysis of DNA / RNA biomolecules. We successfully analysed DNA from blood samples of ovarian cancer patients, identifying specific DNA markers that can predict chemotherapy response. Furthermore, our work in GDM have uncovered DNA markers that indicate early onset of the condition.

Our next goal is to refine laboratory techniques for capturing and enhancing detection of these DNA markers in the blood of women with ovarian cancer. These advancements will make our blood test faster, more cost-effective, and more accurate, ultimately enabling more personalised and effective treatments for ovarian cancer patients.

Student Success: Our team has also celebrated the achievements of our students. Rakesh Sankar, who is investigating chemoresistance in ovarian cancer, has made substantial progress in DNA sequencing and analysis. Similarly, Reshinthine Purushothaman has been exploring DNA markers in GDM and was recently recognised with the People's Choice and Early Career Researcher Awards in the Three Minute Thesis competition. Their research, enabled by LMRF support, is paving the way for significant breakthroughs in women's health.

Supervisory Roles: I currently supervise two students: Reshinthine Purushothaman (honours) and Rakesh Sankar (master's). Previously, I supervised Pragati Lodha (master's) and Vidya Reddy Gummagatta (master's). Pragati is now pursuing a PhD in cancer therapy at Heidelberg University, while Vidya works as a Research Assistant at the Centre for Microbiome Research. The support provided by LMRF has enabled me to nurture researchers capable of addressing complex medical challenges in the future.

Publications and Conferences: This year, we published two significant journal articles: one comparing DNA methylation methods, and another on using extracellular vesicles for targeted cancer therapy. A third article, where I am the senior author, is currently under review. I also presented our research at the International Society for Extracellular Vesicles (ISEV) conference, a key opportunity for collaboration and exposure.

Funding and Grants: Our research group leader Professor Carlos Salomon recently obtained \$2.9 million in funding from LMRF, the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation, and the Australian Government's NHMRC. This Partnership Project will advance our development of the OCRF-7 blood test, designed to detect high-grade serous ovarian cancer, the most common and aggressive form of the disease.

As the genomic lead on this project, I am proud of our role in advancing early detection methods for ovarian cancer. With this substantial financial support, we are poised to make a significant impact on early ovarian cancer detection and patient outcomes.



This year's research highlights include significant milestones such as the LMRF and Lions Club tours (top right and middle) and presentations at key conferences (bottom right). I am also proud to be supervising two students, Reshenthine Purushothaman and Rakesh Sankar (top left). Additionally, our group leader Professor Carlos Salomon (bottom left), secured substantial funding to further advance our research, building upon the foundational genomic work that I established and continue to develop.

Partnerships and Industry Engagement

Our lab is actively enhancing partnerships with both industry and academia. As Chair of the UQCCR Genomics Subcommittee, I have strengthened relationships with major genomic technology providers, including MGI, Illumina, and Oxford Nanopore Technologies. We continue to drive innovation through events like the "Industry Expo of Novel Genomic Technology and Applications", showcasing transformative technologies in medical diagnostics. Additionally, we will host the "Genomics in human health: ECR / Student and Industry symposium" in November, providing a platform for early career researchers, students, and industry professionals to network and explore the latest breakthroughs in genomic technologies related to human health.

Community and Public Engagement

Late last year, we had the pleasure of hosting a successful laboratory tour for the LMRF and Lions Club members at the University of Queensland Centre for Clinical Research (UQCCR), which was covered by the media. You can view the video of the event on the LMRF website. It was a rewarding experience to connect with the public, as well as Lions and LMRF members during the tour. Staying engaged with the Lions community continues to be a priority for me. I'm excited to attend two upcoming Lions events: the Q1 Lions District Convention at the Casino RSM Club and the Lions Annual General Meeting at the Translational Research Institute. These occasions give us the chance to share our progress with a wider audience and show our appreciation for the ongoing support from the LMRF and Lions Clubs.

Conclusion

The past year has been one of substantial growth and accomplishment. Our research, supported by the LMRF, is making significant strides in developing diagnostic solutions for ovarian cancer and GDM. As we move forward, we remain committed to advancing these projects and improving the lives of women through early detection and personalised treatment strategies.

SPARQ-ED'S REPORT

SPARQ-ed is a unique biomedical educational program for school students, delivered through a collaboration between the Department of Education and the Translational Research Institute (TRI).

Students and teachers from across the Queensland schooling sectors (State Schools, Queensland Catholic Education Commission and Independent Schools Queensland) are provided with a practical introduction to biomedical research at our cutting-edge facility featuring a fully equipped Physical Containment (PC2) teaching laboratory and learning centre, located at the TRI in Brisbane.



LMRF generously supports students and families who reside outside of Brisbane to participate in SPARQ-ed programs. This year your support has directly supported three programs.

Senior Research Immersion Program

In 2024, 120 of Queensland's brightest students have been immersed in biomedical research through our Immersion Program. Immersion is open to students studying Year 10, 11 and 12 at a Queensland school. Students work as a team to respond to a research question designed by one of TRI's researchers. Across five days, they perform experiments, analyse real data and report their findings back to the research community, teachers, parents and friends.

Students apply to participate, with each application going before a Review Panel consisting of SPARQ-ed staff and a community representative (rotates three times each year).

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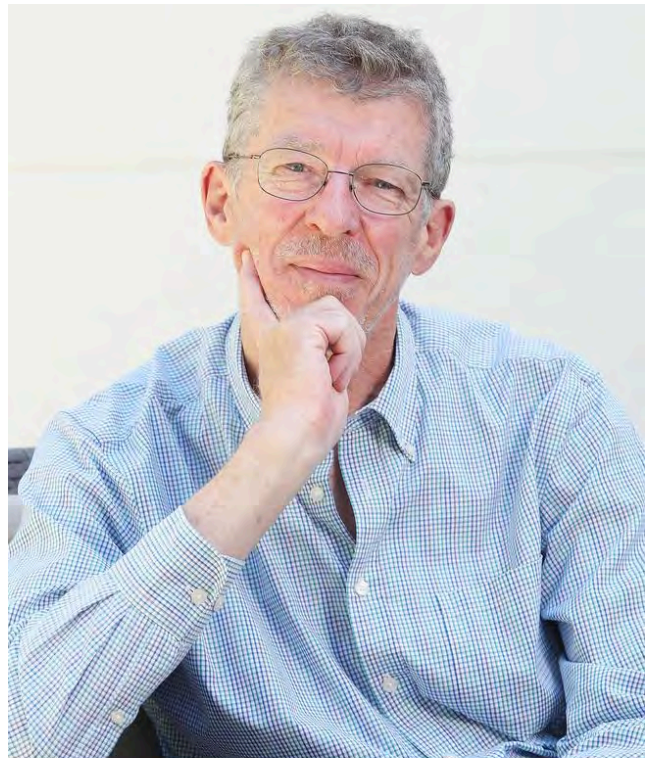

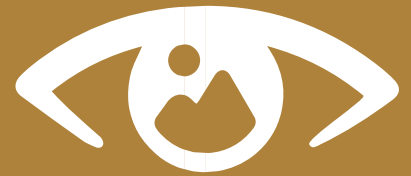

Notes to the Financial Statements for year ended 30 June 2024

The financial statements cover Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation (LMRF), as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation is a company limited by guarantee and is registered as a deductible gift recipient.

Note 1. Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. The responsible persons have determined that the Company is not a reporting entity. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis, are based on historic costs, and do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the following significant policies, which the responsible persons have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless otherwise stated. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Accounting Policies

(a) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Directors to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected.

(b) Plant and equipment

All assets acquired, including plant and equipment, are initially measured at their cost at the date of acquisition, being the fair value of the consideration provided plus incidental costs directly attributable to the acquisition, including costs incurred in getting the assets ready for use. Plant and equipment is carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

Expenditure on repairs and maintenance is recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss on a straight line basis over the estimated useful lives of each item of plant and equipment.

The estimated useful lives for the current and comparative periods are 3–7 years.

Plant and equipment are also assessed for any indicators of impairment each year. Further details on impairment calculations are provided in Note 9.

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(e) Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying values of its financial and non-financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset (being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use) is compared to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of a class of asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(f) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from customers and any outstanding grant receipts. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets.

(g) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(h) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the reporting date for goods and services received by the Company which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amount normally being paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(j) Employee benefits

(i) Short-term benefits

Liabilities for employee benefits for wages, annual leave, long service leave and other leave represent present obligations resulting from employees' services provided to the reporting date and are calculated at undiscounted amounts based on remuneration wage rates that LMRF expects to pay within 12 months after reporting date including related on-costs, such as workers compensation insurance and payroll tax.

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(ii) Other long-term employee benefits

LMRF's net obligation in respect of long-term employee benefits is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

(iii) Superannuation contributions

Liabilities in relation to contributions to superannuation funds (including defined contribution superannuation funds) are recognised as an expense in profit or loss when they are due.

(k) Revenue recognition

Sales revenue

Events, fundraising and raffles are recognised when received or receivable.

Donations and Bequests

Donations and bequests are recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the company satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreement.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the company is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Volunteer services

The company has elected not to recognise volunteer services as either revenue or other form of contribution received. As such, any related consumption or capitalisation of such resources received is also not recognised.

All revenues are recognised at the fair value of the consideration received net of Goods and Services Tax (GST).

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(l) Investment income

Investment income includes interest and dividend income earned on investments in managed share portfolios and interest income on other funds invested. Interest income is recognised as it accrues using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

(n) Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in current receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(p) Comparative Figures

Where necessary, comparatives have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation and disclosure.

(q) Income tax

As the company is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

(r) Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash

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equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Note 2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and Assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The company determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 1, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation, which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2024, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statement, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the directors' declaration.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis of Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial report of Queensland and Northern New South Wales Lions Medical Research Foundation has been prepared in accordance with Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*, including:

- (a) giving a true and fair view of the Company's financial position as at 30 June 2024 and of its performance for the year ended on that date; and
- (b) complying with Australian Accounting Standards to the extent described in Note 1, and Division 60 of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Regulation 2013*.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with similar organisations it is not practical to maintain an effective system of control over revenue recognition and the system of credits available for club donations, therefore we are only able to audit receipts and club credits once they have been entered into the books of account and we may not detect where cash is received and is not included in the recorded income (2024:\$681,952; 2023: \$221,104).

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We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with *the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012* (ACNC Act) and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Company's financial reporting responsibilities under the ACNC Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Directors for the Financial Report

The directors of the Company are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the ACNC Act and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the directors are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report
